FEBRUARY MEETING

The February meeting of the AAAP will be held on Tuesday evening, February 12, 1980 at 8 p.m. in Peyton Hall of Princeton University on Washington Road in Princeton. Dr. Gareth Williams of the Geophysical Fluid Dynamics Laboratory of NOAA in Princeton will be our speaker. His topic is: "The Weather and Climate on Jupiter."

The pre-meeting dinner will be held at Good Time Charley's Restaurant on Route 27 in Kingston, N. J. at 6 p.m. Members may meet in the bar about 15 minutes earlier for drinks before dinner. Notice that this is a different restaurant from where ye usually have dinner.

MARCH MEETING

The AAAP meeting on March 11th will be another members' night. Start thinking now about what you may be able to tell the rest of us about your special interests in astronomy. Talks by individual members should last from about 5 to 20 minutes.

JANUARY MEETING

Several films were shown at the January AAAP meeting. The first film showed the astronomical observing facilities at the National Observatory on Kitt Peak near Tucson, Arizona. Dick Peery showed two short films. The first presented spectacular time lapse movies of the motions in the atmosphere of Jupiter. The second film was a computer simulation of the Voyager fly-by of Saturn. Between films John Church told us about the triple conjunction of Jupiter and Mars this winter and spring.

OBSERVATORY NEWS

Regular Friday night observing sessions will not be held this month, but any member not having an Observatory key may call a keyholder and arrange an observing session at their mutual convenience. If you go, keep in mind that weather and road conditions in the Park may make access to the Observatory difficult at times this month. Remember to approach the Observatory via Brick Yard Road headed southward from its intersection with Church Road in Titusville. John Church has prepared a list of predictions for favorable lunar occultations of bright stars to occur at the Observatory in the next several weeks, and this is posted on our little bulletin board near the opening mechanism crank. If you have never observed an occultation, this is a good month to see one.

Our program chairman, Dave Brown, still thinks that some kind of camp-out next spring or summer may be worth considering.
