JUNE MEETING

The June meeting of the AAAP will be held on Tuesday evening, June 10, 1980 at 8 p.m. in Peyton Hall of Princeton University on Ivy Lane off Washington Road in Princeton. Present AAAP Director Roxanne Peery and her husband Dick, a former AAAP Director, will speak on the total eclipse of the sun as observed from Kenya, Africa on February 16, 1980. Their talk will be illustrated with color slides of the eclipse and of wild animals photographed on a safari into the wilds of Kenya.

The pre-meeting dinner will be held at the Foolish Fox Restaurant in Rocky Hill, N. J. (on Rt. 206 near Rt. 518) beginning at 6 p.m. Members generally meet in the bar for drinks at 5:45 p.m. before dinner.

MAY MEETING

Mr. George Levine, NASA engineer and Project Manager, spoke on the Space Telescope at the May AAAP meeting. This 2.4-meter aperture reflecting telescope is tentatively scheduled to be launched into a 500-km high orbit by the upcoming Space Shuttle in 1983. It will afford astronomers a sevenfold improvement in resolution and a 50-fold increase in lightgathering power over earth-based telescopes and expand the volume of the observable Universe by about 350 times.
