
From the Director

Board Meeting of the AAAP

May 9, 2002

Director Kirk Alexander called the meeting to order at 7:42 PM.

Starquest Chairman Don Monticello reported that 15 people have registered so far for Jersey Starquest (in addition to 3 people receiving free passes). The next issue of Sidereal Times will contain a second printing of the Starquest registration form and additional information on Starquest will be included on the club's website. Don has e-mailed Starquest information to previous Starquest attendees. The deadline for registration is May 24th. Current speakers for Starquest include Bob Vanderbei and Mary Lou West.

Louisa Lockette will send out a second round of publicity information on Starquest to the local newspapers. Starquest brochures will be available at the observatory for distribution on public nights. The board has decided to spend \$400 on door prizes for Starquest.

Observatory Chairman Rex Parker thanked Bill Murray and Gene Ramsey for the cleanup of the observatory. A work party for later this summer is being planned. Projects to be done at this work party include checking the status of the rail track and painting the observatory. Ron Mittelstaedt will pick up the new focuser for the 6" refractor at the NEAF conference. George Walker has had the refractor tube repaired and recoated. All keyholders are requested to log their observations using the C14 in order to create a record of the optical performance of the C14. The optics on the C14 will be cleaned and checked in order to optimize its performance. The new Paramount for the C14 will be delivered sometime this summer. Rex will ask John Church to fix the alarm on the observatory.

Nominations Chairman Rex Parker reported that the current slate of candidates for the elections in May are:

Volunteers from the AAAP will be needed to act as guides for this trip.

Regular Meeting of the AAAP May 14, 2002

Director Kirk Alexander called the meeting to order at 8:03 PM.

Kirk reported that the AAAP had been given an award by the State

of NJ for the volunteer activities the AAAP sponsors in the state park (In particular for Vic Belanger's "Introduction to Amateur Astronomy" program and our public observing nights.) Kirk thanked all the members whose efforts resulted in this award.

Gene Ramsey generously donated several pieces of excess equipment (including several Barlow lenses and an eyepiece case) to club members who could make use of them.

Kirk made an announcement about Jersey Starquest (June 7-9) encouraging club members to sign up for the star party. Speakers for the event include Mary Lou West and Bob Vanderbei.

Program Chairman Mark Lopez introduced the speaker, Bill Murray of the AAAP whose talk was titles "CCD Astro-imaging - Tricks of the Trade". The talk was well received.

Acting Nominations chairman Larry Smith reported on the slate of officers for the 2002-3 term. The slate was:

The election was then held and the slate was approved unanimously.

Asst. Observatory Chairman Gene Ramsey reported that the newly landscaped area west of the observatory was ready for use as an observing field but should not be driven on. Gene then reported on several projects that needed to be done around the observatory. These included building a sheet metal stop at the point where the roof meets the rails to prevent entry by squirrels (cost \$70), repairs to the masonry columns supporting the rails (cost \$30), and rust proofing and repair of the rails (approximate cost \$50-\$100). The club approved an appropriation of \$150 for Gene to buy supplies and begin the repairs.

Secretary Bill Murray reported that the June meeting (June 11th) would be held at the planetarium in Trenton. Planetarium director Dick Perry will present the planetarium show "Journey to the Stars". Dick will be retiring this year after 35 years at the planetarium and Bill suggested that the club by him a card for the many years of planetarium programs he has given for the AAAP.

From the Treasurer

Peter Oppenheim gave me a year's rest, which I am most grateful for, but I'mmmm BACK! Yes, I'm back in the treasurer's position. Thirteen years just wasn't enough.

This weekend I attended the Northeast Astronomy Forum. I was able to obtain several items for NJ Starquest door prizes. Picked up several eyepieces at the Tele-Vue table, than on to the Software Bisque booth to view what our new Paramount G-1100ME mount will look like and how it will operate, a fine machine. Our unit is in this summer's production run and hopefully we will see it in July. Steve also gave me a door prize of "The Sky" version 3.

Next was Jim Kendrick's booth where I got five red flashlights, something for the younger attendees to our event. Last stop was with our old friends that have a new name, "High Point Scientific." I got some good prices on a pair of Celestron 10X50 binoculars and a Telrad finder. I may have a chance of winning a door prize this year hearing that the registration is down. I also obtained a 2" Tele-Vue "Starbrite" diagonal for the Hastings 6 ¼" refractor.

On the subject of the Hastings refractor, we are now the owners of a work of art. A company call Burgess Optical took on the task of making a tail piece/focuser. Bill Burgess took this task as a challenge. Wanting to keep the focuser in tune with the era of the scope (1879) he made the housing out of brass. The drawtube has about a five-inch travel. The fine focus is about twenty to one. Even the knurling on the focusing knob is of a design of the late 19th century. For the love of making this scope a showpiece with his focuser, Bill took a loss on this sale. We are most grateful for his dedication. We also need to thank George Walker's son who had the optical tube of the Hastings stripped and painted and the brass polished. This is one scope that will be better than new.

I was so impress with this focuser and the one he made Ralph for his Astro Physics that I'm having Bill build one for my C-11. He also has 2.7" eyepieces for this focuser, which he is lending me to use at Starquest.

The treasury balance is \$8794.89 and we have 133 members.



From the Archives

From time to time I will be bringing things from the archives to the pages of the Sidereal Times. To start this column off, nothing would be more appropriate than the Minutes Of Our First Meeting; Nov. 5, 1962, nearly 40 years ago.

After introductory remarks by Robert Sanders, founder of the Association, it was moved that the name of the organization be Amateur Astronomers Association of Princeton. The motion was passed. Mr. Sanders suggested that three committees be formed, and appointed members as follows. Meetings and Programs: Gifford Havens, chairman; Stan Wells, Nancy Harris. By-Laws: Fred Bowers, chairman; Milo Wadlin, Ron Rogers. Nominating: it was suggested that this committee wait for a couple months to allow members to become acquainted. After some discussion of meeting dates and times, it was decided to hold meetings on the second Monday of each month. The next meeting will be on December 10, 1962 at 8 PM.

There was some discussion of telescopes owned by members. Six members have their own telescopes, and four have observatories. Mr. Sanders suggested that the next meeting be devoted to telescopes. A motion to make Sanders temporary chairman was passed. He offered to have the next meeting at the Lawrenceville School. A motion to adjourn was passed. (Signed) Gifford Havens.



The best way to get to the observatory is to take Interstate 95 South towards Pennsylvania. Then take Scotch road at Exit 3 and proceed north (this amounts to right). Then, at the third traffic light take a left onto the Washington Crossing-Pennington road (County Route 546). Take this road to the first traffic light and take a right onto Trenton-Harbourton road (County Route 579). Take this road to the first driveway on the left, this is the Phillips Farm/Soccer Field entrance to the park. There is a series of three gates with club combination locks. If the gates are not open, you will need the lock combination to open the gate or be accompanied by a Keyholder member.
